HISTORY

1931: First Hahnenkamm Races comprising of Downhill, Slalom and Combined

1932: First ladies' race (until 1961)

1937: Hahnenkamm Race held for the first time on the Streif and Ganslern racecourses

1938 - 1945: no races

1946: First races after the 2nd World War

1959: First live TV broadcast by ORF

1967: Hahnenkamm races staged as part of the newly founded Alpine Ski World Cup

1999: Record attendance with a total of 99,000 spectators
